

# **Community Service**

The committee decided that again this year we would try to assist those in need by supporting charities that have a direct contact with the community. To that end we supported Feed Me Bellarine and the Salvation Army.

### 1. Feed Me Bellarine.

a. At Christmas, we donated Christmas puddings to be given out with meals from Feed Me Bellarine valued at \$814.

b. In January, we held a simple meal, which was cooked by Coogs and

Salads were prepared by members of the club. The meal was attended by the club members and families , served in the Pavilion and the proceeds from the meal of \$1100 was presented to Feed Me Bellarine.

c. In May we held a barbecue on the premises of Feed Me Bellarine and the proceeds of \$220 was donated to the charity.

### 2. Salvation Army.

a. Voucher scheme. We continued to issue vouchers for use at the Op Shops. These were distributed by the Salvation Army pastors through the schools where families were identified to be in need.

b. We provided Christmas cakes and Christmas puddings to the value of \$1629, be given to families at the Salvation Army Christmas Cheer event. We also provided \$1000 worth of vouchers for presents for teenagers to be given at the same event. Dianne Hobbs of the Salvation Army identified the Return to School in January as a very expensive time for families, so we donated \$1500 worth of vouchers to supply items for school.

c. The club members collected and donated warm blankets and warm clothing to be given to the Outreach Van for distribution to those who are homeless or sleeping rough.

d. Kath Venters organised the collection of toiletry supplies for those escaping family violence.

e. Some members of the club filled boxes with food as Reverse Advent Calendars to be given to families in need.

f. Joint project with Bellarine North Rotary club. Following a meeting with Dianne from the Salvation Army it was agreed that both clubs would donate towards the cost of a Family Therapist for those families who need professional psychological help. It is an expensive program, but is one which is greatly needed by very dysfunctional families. Our two clubs have each donated \$2000.

g. The Out Reach Van storage area was redesigned and new items were installed by Rod Birrell.

### 3. GERN.

Gary presented a proposal to set up a Geelong Emergency Relief Network, similar to the Western Emergency Relief Network on which he had previously worked. It was agreed that we should carry out a survey of relief organisations already in existence and the need for more availability of help in this area. A visit to WERN was organised in June to give club members an better understanding of the Project. This was very enlightening.

#### 4. No to Family Violence .

Andrea Tierney has been our representative on this initiative, working with other Rotary clubs in the Geelong area. A walk was held to highlight the problem. There will probably be further involvement in the future.

### 5. Town Entry Signs.

Gordon is also a member of Ocean Grove Community Association , and has received a communication from the City of Greater Geelong showing some designs for the new entry signs which show an aboriginal design as a background to the town sign. There will be further meetings with Council to get more information on how the signs will be developed.

#### 6. Foreign coin collection.

We collected 6.5 kg of foreign coins through the Bendigo banks in Ocean Grove, and BarwonHeads and our own club. These coins are distributed back to Counties of origin, and the proceeds are used to support overseas charities. Our percentage of the collection awarded our club \$490 which have allocated to Shelter Box Australian Gaza Appeal.

### 7. Blister Pack Recycling .

Following advice from Rotarian Barb Sheehan, the district environment officer, we set up a blister pack collection at the local pharmacy. This was to assist the community to recycle, and therefore help the environment. In January, we set up our initial project and it was very quickly adopted by the community and the six bins we supplied were soon filled up. The cost of the project is \$1000 for recycling of six complete bins. Our second donation to the recycling bins was shared by Ocean Grove Bowling Club and this again was very well received. There will soon be a need for a third donation and this time the chemist may also contribute to the donation to pay for the bins which makes this a less expensive project for our club.

#### 8. Bellarine Community Hub.

The community service committee jointly with the youth committee have agreed to support the Friday night youth program run by Bellarine Community Hub. This program is designed to help disadvantaged young people to develop confidence, self reliance, community spirit and friendships. Both committees would like to support the program by providing an extra member of staff so that more young people can be helped. A speaker from the Community Hub gave a very full oversight of the program and emphasised the benefits obtained by the young people. We donated \$2000 on behalf of our joint committees.

9. We donated funds to \$1000 to Cherished Pets, and \$500 to Hair Aid.

### 10. Goorambat Veterans Retreat.

The Club received a lot of information from a speaker from this organisation, which assists veterans and their families. The Board has agreed to submit a Matching Grant Application to the District in support of upgrading the seminar /workshop room to to make it a usable space. The room is integral to the delivery of services and support to veterans and their families.

#### 11. Bunnings event in June.

Bunnings have organised a community event for various community groups, to give a platform to explain and illustrate their various projects within the community. Pearl, Rod Birrell and Gary

attended the event to highlight our various projects.

#### 12. Cadel Evans Race.

In January, 16 club members assisted with the marshalling of this race around our area, and as a result earned \$1000 for the club, which was used to support some of our community programs. Well done everyone.

#### 13. New Probus Club.

In April we sponsored a new Probus Club in Point Lonsdale. Several Rotary members assisted with the inaugural meeting, and our club donated \$500 to assist with the initial expenses.

#### Environment Committee Report. 2023/24

1. Plenty of good ideas and preliminary work, but not a lot to show on the ground/ water this year. I must acknowledge the assistance of PHF Warren Chapman and Rotarian, Andy McKoy who have kept the pressure up via the OGCA during a rather challenging six months for me.

#### 2. Lookout reserve

Ongoing checks of signs and equipment continued. Infill planting was delayed due to curb and sealing of the car park. In partnership with committee members of the Community Association we had lobby council officers for the approval of an all abilities viewing platform on the high point.

#### 3. Rotary 100 trees.

Maintenance of the eucalypt trees was done monthly and many are making good progress.

No progress on the development of a master concept plan for signage and controlled access to the "100 Eucalyptus " zone on the Wallington Roadside verge. Liaison with the council by OGCA was supported.



#### 4. Tree and Shrub Planting

We have assisted with planting seedling stock in OG Park for the Ocean Grove Park Committee and on the Spit for Barwon Coast Care.

#### 5. Mangrove Experience/ New Public Open Spaces.

There is a strong positive community support for the concept outlined in the "White Mangrove Experience " flyer. Discussions have been held with the CCMA regarding the opportunities to seek independent grant funding for "low priority " mangrove nature walking trails and signage as proposed by the FINAL approved version of Kitjarra - dja- bul Bullarto Langi-ut Rivers Master Plan.

#### 6. Roadside Biodiversity Area.

We offered to assist Council, and/or Regional Roads Victoria by "adopting " the Moonah woodland verge along the west side of Wallington Road from the 100 trees and Ocean Grove entry signs to Guthridge Street. This is a roadside biodiversity area, declared and signed by the City, and borders the golf course and Ramsar Wetlands managed by Parks Victoria. Page No. 12 of 27 7. Parks Victoria Sheepwash Boardwalk Project.

We have offered to support Parks Victoria in their efforts to fund and execute the extension of the Sheepwash Boardwalk, which has a high priority in the Kitjarra Master Plan. Noel Emselle, Environment Committee.

The club has received a District Bronze Environment Award and a Silver Environment Award for the work carried out by our Rotary Members on all aspects of improving the Environment. I would like to thank the Community Committee and the Environment Committee for their enthusiasm and hard work over this last year, and thank the Club and Board Members for their support of all our various projects.

**Bali Smiles:** This year we funded six students to attend school. Gede Mangun Artawan graduated from school this year with excellent results and is moving into the workplace.

We received photos and reports two times during the year. Once the reports were translated, they were placed onto the Club web site with relevant photos. As the school year commences in Indonesia in July, we have already paid for the 2024~25 scholarships.

**Cambodia:** This year we supported a student through the Cambodian Rural Student Trust.

Chhengheang studies in Siem Reap and is a member of the Rotaract Club of Siem Reap. Chhengheang is studying Business Administration at Pannasastra University of Siem Reap. The University focuses on tuition in English language only.

**Myanmar:** We were successful in obtaining a District Grant to supply information technology equipment to Loh Baw Middle School, Myanmar. Computers (x4), printer (x1), projector (x1), projector screen (x1) and printer ink were purchased in Thailand for the Loh Baw Middle School in Myanmar. Goods were transported to Myanmar and were set up by teachers. The equipment is

being used by teachers and students at the school. This is the first-time information technology equipment has been used in the school.

**Nepal:** Through Sungabha Nepal we sponsored seven children to attend primary school, in rural Nepal, for a year and be fully equipped with learning resources. We receive reports on the project which are placed on the Club website

**ShelterBox Australia:** This year the Club donated \$1,500 to the Morocco Earthquake appeal and \$1,500 Libya Flood Appeal.

**Rotary Overseas Recycled Playgrounds.** This year Rod Greer led teams to dismantle playgrounds for both City of Greater Geelong and City of Ballarat.

Donations were also made to Operation Cleft, RAWCS Water Project in PNG (Warrnambool Rotary), Mount Martha Rotary Water Project in PNG and Rotary Australia Repurposing Equipment Geelong (to help with container transportation costs).

## **Youth Service Report**

The Youth Service Committee for 2023-2024 comprised Paul Brewster (Chair), Penny Broome, Geoff Chandler, Jenny Clairs, Judy Greer, Tony Haines, Meredith O'Neill, Lyndy Stagg, Chris Watson and Jenny Wright. We welcomed Penny Broome and Jenny Clairs as new members to our Committee and Paul Brewster took over from Meredith O'Neill as Chair.

The work of the Youth Committee is primarily focussed on schools, and as a consequence, projects are mostly based on a school year rather than the Rotary year. So at the first meeting of the new Rotary year, it was confirmed that for the balance of the 2023 school year it was a matter of "steady as she goes" with most projects already well under

way. We did, however, resolve to investigate other opportunities such as Rotary Youth Driver Awareness and the School Leadership Programme. Ideas such as Rotaract, Interact and Chef for a Month were considered too much for the Committee to undertake this calendar year but would be considered in the future. After considerable discussion it was voted not to participate in the Rotary Youth Exchange programme this year – mostly due to uncertainty surrounding the rules and regulations both in Australia and Overseas which are constantly changing, becoming more restrictive and to some extent, confusing.

The signature project remained the Rotary Junior Community Awards with 4 schools (Ocean Grove Primary, Wallington Primary, Surfside Primary and Our Lady Star of the Sea) participating. A total of 48 students completed the programme including one modified programme and were presented with certificates. An awards night was held at the 31st October 2023 dinner meeting when 12 participants showcased their work and spoke of their experience in front of their teachers, parents and Rotary Club members – a daunting task !

Judy Greer and Tony Haines (who have masterminded the RJCA programme for countless years) announced their desire to step back from that role – although emphasising that they would still be around to participate. Lyndy Stagg and Jenny Wright volunteered to take over from them at the start of the 2024 academic year, and have done a magnificent job in the first 6 months. This year Wallington Primary has decided not to participate – a new Principal and some re-organisation means they have enough to keep them busy. They have said they will revisit their ability to participate towards the end of 2024. Even with one less school, we still have 44 students participating in the programme this year.

We supported Queenscliff Primary school with a donation towards their expenses representing Victoria in the International finals of the Tournament of Minds (language and literature section). The event was finally won by the Woollahra Public School (NSW). Congratulations to the Queenscliff students for progressing so far in the Tournament.

Transition bursaries (for students moving from year 6 to year 7) were again offered to all 8 primary schools in our area. A total of 19 bursaries at \$300 were awarded to assist with the expensive start to year 7 and very gratefully received by parents.

Three Roy Rose Memorial Citizenship Awards in the form of book vouchers were presented to students from Bellarine Secondary College at their annual awards night.

A continuing VCE scholarship of \$1,000 was awarded to a Bellarine Secondary College student in year 12 with the recipient of another scholarship of \$1,000 to a student in year 11 yet to be decided.

Unfortunately the Santos Science Experience was cancelled for this Rotary Year but is likely to be resumed later in 2024. We will seek nominations to attend the Marine & Freshwater Discovery Centre, Queenscliff as soon as the programme is confirmed. If the Santos Science Experience does not continue, we will investigate participating in the National Youth Science Forum.

Late in 2023, our two potential candidates for the RYLA camp in Kangaroobie withdrew, and we were unable to find replacements. We have 2 possibilities for the 2025 camp which will be followed up. As a result of not spending the money budgeted for RYLA we were able to make a donation of \$2,000 to the Drop In Youth Programme at the Bellarine Community and Training Hub.

We attended a Barwon Institute of Sport breakfast as a result of our Club's 2022 donation of \$3,000 to support several students from our area. We committed to repeating this donation with the proviso that it is to go to students from the area served by our Club. The donation has been

made and paid approximately half the annual fee for 13 students from Ocean Grove and Barwon Heads.

At our January meeting with the beginning of a new academic year, the committee decided that as well as continuing with existing projects, we would contact Bellarine Secondary College to ascertain their interest in participating in Defying the Drift (a week long residential course at Longerenong Agricultural College) and the Deakin University Science/Engineering Challenge. These possibilities are still being followed up.

At our May meeting, we had a brainstorming session for projects to be undertaken by the Youth Committee next Rotary Year. We will obviously continue with successful projects but are looking for opportunities to expand our influence. It's going to be exciting but challenging.!!

I am indeed fortunate that all members of our dedicated team have confirmed their desire to continue their participation in the Youth Committee for the 2024-2025 year. The addition of Lynne Carlson (as she becomes the Immediate Past President) will be matched by a reduced input from Meredith O'Neill as she takes up her position as President so our membership will remain basically as it is now. My sincere and heartfelt thanks to all members of the Committee for their professional approach and untiring efforts to bring about successful outcomes for our projects in 2023-2024. Their good humour throughout the year have made it a pleasure to be a member of the Youth Committee and I look forward to an even broader range of projects being completed with equal success in the coming year.

# **Vocational Service Report**

The year of 2023 – 2024 provided an opportunity for the community to continue to emerge into the post COVID period and for our members to reengage in activities that draw the community together.

The Vocational Service Committee had been impacted by a change of leadership and membership of the committee in the previous year. The committee welcomed a number of new members and came together to review the previous years' activity and to identify priorities for the coming year. The committee decided to focus on the formal review the Vocational Awards program, invite guest speakers to Rotary events, support ANZAC appreciation



packages and to host the 14th Vocational Awards program. The opportunity to develop a mentorship program was considered however a decision was made to defer this until 2024-2025 period.

### **ANZAC Appreciation Packages**

Recognising the contribution of veterans the Rotary Club has continued to support the circulation of appreciation packages to returned soldiers living in our community. Ty Simmons a local trader has continued to provide support of the initiative through access to his warehouse to enable packing of the parcels. Small businesses across Ocean Grove area donated a range of goods including fruit and vegetables and general grocery items. All appreciation packages were packed and delivered by a dedicated group of Rotarians. In 2024 50 packages were packed and delivered.

#### **Guest Speakers**

Vocational Service committee invited previous winners of the Vocational Awards program to be a guest speaker at a Rotary meeting. Coastline Alfresco accepted the invitation and offered an insight into their business and the impact of being an award winner.

#### **Vocational Awards**

The 2024 Vocational Awards program was held during the March – June period with the Awards Celebration hosted on Tuesday 4 June at Ocean Grove Bowling Club. The Awards night was the culmination of months of planning and the implementation of a number of key milestones including securing sponsors, promotion of the awards program, calling for nominations, encouraging submissions, collating nominations, convening judging panels, organising the awards night and hosting of the awards evening.

## **Duck Race Report**



The Fundraiser Barwon River Duck Race was held Saturday March 30 2024 on a warm and sunny day and some \$30,000 was raised on the day – the best result so far in Rotary's history of organizing this event. The main race duck numbers increased by 500 to 2000 total and all but 92 were sold.



An enlarged committee was established including Gary Willson, Richard Cahill, Lisa Hanley and Rod Bush, assisted by a sales team of Lyndy Stagg, Deliah Naumann. It was gratifying that

other rotarians played roles of ticket organisers, media advertisers, community activity supervisors and BBQ duties volunteers. It is now a truly whole club activity.

The 3 races were held separately this year: the 40 corporate ducks at 1pm, the 300 blue Kinder Kids ducks at 1:15 and the main race of 2000 yellow ducks.

The day went smoothly, after a change in wind direction meant the silt boom had to be transported across the river just before the race. The use of a silt boom was initiated due to the greater number of ducks to be collected, but proved less effective than the 3 IRB boats provided by the Ocean Grove Surf Lifesaving Club (who had initially promised 1 boat).

Bellarine Paddlers club also provided a number of paddlers to keep the pelaton of ducks together during the race. Barwon Heads Scouts were in charge of duck collection, washing and returning the ducks to storage and this went smoothly.

The inclusion of community activities for children were well organized and lightly used but provided a festive atmosphere to the event. The BBQ trailer raised \$240 with sales of sausages and bacon & egg sandwiches, proving popular with the public

#### Sales, Media and Advertising

Sales were in line with previous years with a slow uptake until the last week. The 3 sales sites in Point Lonsdale, Ocean Grove and Barwon Heads provided good visual advertising. The use of the 'Square' payment system assisted the sales at the 3 sites

Try Booking on line platform was used and the sales and information was generally well used, allowing the club to identify school participation and track sales. 8 schools were selected to be recipients of funds but their advertising and sales are in early stages of development – although each school was greatly appreciative of the resulting funds totalling \$12,975 and it is anticipated their in-school advertising footprint might be larger next year.

The sales of corporate ducks was greater this year amassing close to \$4000. Thanks to Lisa for her work in this area.

The general profit after providing funds and paying outlaid costs was around \$20000.

Our on line presence was greater due to the use of social media. Local newspapers provided 3 large advertising opportunities

#### On the Day

The club turned out in numbers, pitching in with last minute sales, presentation of prizes, kayaks to collect the prize winners and the setting up and taking down of marquees, collection of rubbish, posting of signs and redeeming of them at the end as well as presenting a very professional face to the public.


