President's Annual Report

Rotary Theme 2020/21: Rotary Opens Opportunities

I doubt that anyone in our Club could have forecast the difficulties to be faced in 2020/21. With severe restrictions coming in almost immediately after our Changeover Dinner, all the planning went out the window and a new world of electronic meetings came to be the norm. Grateful thanks must go to Rod Bush for finding the right medium and then teaching and encouraging a large club in its use.

The main concern with lockdown was how to keep members connected and to keep up their interest in Rotary and what it stands for. Pleasingly, members embraced the idea of Zoom and for those uncomfortable with it, we still managed to keep in touch through the Bulletin and phone calls, and have more or less normal meetings. Thank you to all for your persistence. Zoom even enabled us to share drinks on Friday evenings and chat about things outside Rotary - another great way of keeping in touch.

The prospective loss of income from the Art Show, GDFL gates, car raffle and the markets was confronting. Committee budgets had to be redrawn with worst case scenarios developed. In July it wasn't looking good and the Board was concerned how some of its normal recipients would be able to carry on. Treasurer John Paton kept us on track during the difficult time and rejoiced when funds started coming in. Thank you John.

By late September, there was some very distant light at the end of the tunnel and it looked like we might be able to start up our market in November with restrictions in place: plenty of sanitiser and lots of signs telling people to keep apart and wear a mask. I don't think any of us anticipated the crowd that turned up to that first market - all eager to get outside and do something different but happy to keep to the restrictions.

A sensible decision by the Board was to hold all monies collected at the market gates and to distribute these later in the Rotary year to those we normally support and perhaps some new ones that deserved attention. With the help of Rotarians' partners and families, we were able to man the market gates and collect sums of money that gave us hope we would have an almost normal year financially. The Board later agreed that this was a better method than asking various organisations to man the gates. It has meant we could distribute funds more equitably. The local community showed great faith in Rotary by giving far more at the gates than was expected (\$19,837) and this shows the respect our Club has garnered in the area. My thanks must go to Rotarian partners and their families who took part enthusiastically and helped to encourage people coming into the market to support Rotary. Our Club has an excellent reputation in the community and as a result, people were very generous. Adrian Schmidt made everything run smoothly at the markets as usual despite having record numbers of stalls. Thank you Adrian.

Despite being shut down for four months, the Club still managed to raise a net income of \$56,004 to the end of May 2021. Thanks go to Home Hardware for the donation of a barbecue to raffle at the markets, helping to add to our funds. Well done to those who manned the raffle stall.

After looking at the financial records for the previous years, it was obvious that the market sausage sizzle was bringing in substantial funds, so a BBQ trailer was investigated and ordered through Overlanda Caravans in Ararat. Grants were sought and received,

donations given and in the end, our Club had to find a smaller amount to pay the balance. It will make life much easier for those manning the BBQs with no heavy lifting and with much of our cooking and sundry equipment able to be washed on site and stowed inside. It will also provide a good source of income in future years. I encourage members to have a go at the sausage sizzle as

it's great fun and a good way to promote our Club and Rotary in general. Thanks go to Graeme Chamberlain and Wal Kelly who encouraged this activity in the last few years and helped us with another way to earn funds. Thanks to the many cooks and also to Lynne Carlson and Marion Walton as we danced around in a small space to serve the public. In 2020/21 the sausage sizzle brought in \$14,204.

The great support of the Board gave me confidence in leading this Club forward in a year where initially there seemed little hope. Grateful thanks go to each of them - Vice President Graeme Chamberlain, Past President Marion Walton, President Elect Alan Keyse, Treasurer John Paton, Foundation Director Gordon King, Membership Director Rod Bush, Public Image Director Xenia Williamson and Service Projects Director Chris Foster. A new structure for the Board was approved by Club Members and that will come into place at the start of the 2021/22 Rotary Year with Alan Keyse leading the charge in the President's role.

No Club can function well without a competent Secretary and we have certainly had one in Pearl Macmillan. The amount of work that Pearl has done in the last few years in that role is a great example of dedication to Rotary and I can't thank her enough for her support in my year.

For those of us who love going to the annual conference, it was yet another year where we couldn't congregate as a District in person, listen to great speakers and have some fun. Let's hope that can change that in the year to come.

We heard some great speakers over the year. Probably the standout was Mike Dillon who kept us enthralled with his films of Everest with Sir Edmund Hillary. Credit goes to Janet Alexander for her sterling work in finding interesting people to keep us entertained during the year and make us think about all the worthy causes out there.

Membership continues to grow thanks to Rod Bush's work in that area. We were able to welcome Isobel Paton, Kath Venters, Lyndy Stagg, Lisa and Harry Hanley, David Larkin, Graham O'Donnell, John Karis and Jo McDowell into the Club. Our newer members are showing great enthusiasm. Sadly, Isobel Paton had to resign due to the effect of Covid 19 on her family situation and Amy Hawker left due to family illness. We also farewelled Dick Clay and Vic Harnath, both long term and respected members of our Club. The expanding size of our Club and the need for more space led to a search for a larger and quieter venue with the Ocean Grove Surf Club fitting the bill.

As from 1 July 2020, we embraced the Borough of Queenscliffe into our area of service following the closure of the Queenscliffe Rotary Club. It was important to create connections with the Borough and the Queenscliffe Primary School seized the day when we needed letters from local children to send with toiletry packs to a remote school in the Northern Territory as as part of the DG Partner project, End Trachoma. We ended up with twice as many letters as needed so each NT child would have gained two new friends. Thanks to all members who contributed to the packs, Judy Greer for organising the collection of toiletries and putting it all together. Discussions with the Rotary Club of Bellarine North have resulted in them remaining at the Queenscliffe market (sausage sizzle) and our club taking over that function at the Point Lonsdale market.

Community: Sculpture: congratulations to Gordon King who managed to achieve what many tried hard to do - reinstatement of the sculpture that was removed from the Aquatic Centre many years ago. After many approaches to different organisations over the years and false hopes that a home had finally been found, we were disappointed so many times. Now the sculpture is back almost where it originally stood. Noel Essex helped to supervise the reinstatement process and also repaired some work on the stone surround at the base - thank you Noel. Thanks also to those who patiently stored the sculpture on their properties over those years.

Walking track: the combination of Rotary, Keep Victoria Beautiful (Adopt a Roadside) and the City of Greater Geelong has come together to reinstate this walking track from the Shell Road/Grubb Road roundabout to the entrance into the nature reserve. Council looks like providing an entry gate into the nature reserve so that there will be safer pedestrian access from the gate near Oakdene estate down to the roundabout.

International: Playgrounds: the lockdown meant that only one small playground could be dismantled in Point Lonsdale. However, the good news is that there is now a District 9780 focus working through Don Shields in Geelong, to the extent that the District now has a container almost ready to go the Phillippines.

Following discussions with Craig Salmon and his assurances that support for Solmaid School in Bangladesh could be sourced elsewhere, it was decided that International funds could be directed elsewhere, with a joint project in Vanuatu thought to be the best.

R100: after a number of months of meeting with Clubs from Groups 9 and 10 when nothing seemed to be happening, a baton relay from Torquay to Ocean Grove, Drysdale and Geelong was finally organised with the baton being carried by Rotarians chauffeured in a Harley Davidson sidecar. Geelong Clubs arrived as well, many in vintage cars, to celebrate Rotary's 100th year in Australia. It's hoped that 100 trees can be planted by Rotary Ocean Grove in the very near future as an additional acknowledgement of this significant anniversary.

Oral History project: Many times, people have said that they wished they had written down an older person's story before it was too late. Thanks to Ann Hodgkinson, there is now a record of what it was like to live on the southern part of the Bellarine from the WW2 era to the 1970s. Many interesting stories have been told so far, with more to come. These stories reside on the Club website and are well worth listening to. In future the stories may also be shared with Bellarine library services so that the wider community can tune in.

Youth: Graham Bath Junior Community Awards: Restrictions meant that this had to be cancelled in 2019/2020 but once again, in February this year, the team was able to get things up and running with Ocean Grove, Surfside, Star of the Sea and Wallington Primary Schools taking part. Tony Haines, Judy Greer and Geoff Chandler have been involved for many years with this wonderful scheme included in the Youth Services portfolio capably led by Meredith O'Neill

Vocational: The work done by Lynne Carlson and her committee on the Vocational awards was exceptional this year and, with the assistance of Ty Simons from the Ocean Grove Business Association, the community is now more aware of giving local businesses the recognition they deserve. Presentation night in May this year was a huge event with the winners and runners up able to bring along their colleagues and families. Thank you to Lynne and Ty.

Public Image: Xenia Williamson has given Rotary a boost in the local area with many articles in the local press and especially on Facebook - an important way of communicating with people in our area and a great way to get information out into the community. Thanks, Xenia.

Foundation: Gordon King continued his enthusiasm for the Foundation and we now have another member of the Paul Harris Society in Chris Watson. This Club is fortunate to now have five Society members.

Golf Day: As a funds booster, John Calnin organised a successful Rotary Golf Day at Lonsdale Links in late May. This was well attended and the auction afterwards resulted in all items being purchased and a profit of \$3,500. Thank you John.

Duck Race: A new project taken up by Heather Willson turned out to be a massive day at Barwon Heads. The town was packed and extra ducks sold on the day till there wasn't a duck left. The work done in the background by Heather and helpers was huge and we hope this will be a regular feature in our Rotary calendar. Thanks to Heather (and Gary Willson as well).

Regrettably, our social events were almost non-existent and we missed the fun of them, with restrictions keeping numbers low at gatherings and the ever-present threat of any event having to be cancelled at short notice. However, we did manage in January to have a movie night at Waurn Ponds and a visit to Brewicolo.



District Grants



The Club had previously been successful in 2019-20 in obtaining a District Grant for this purpose, but circumstances preventing the work proceeding at that time. Accordingly, the Club sought approval from District to repurpose part of the Grant (\$1,000) for a Covid-19 project, and a local community food project, "Feed Me Bellarine", was selected. The balance of the Grant was surrendered to District.

The sculpture was finally installed in May 2021 at a site at the Bellarine Aquatic and Sports Centre (close to its original location), and the reconciliation report submitted to District.


Donations to The Rotary Foundation

Community Service Report



1. Community Sculpture Reinstatement -

In 2020-21 Ocean Grove Rotary was again successful in obtaining a matching District Grant of \$3,000 for the reinstatement of a community sculpture, comprising three vertical granite panels. The work was by local sculptor, Noel Essex.

After many false starts, the sculpture was finally installed at the Bellarine Aquatic and Sports Centre on 14 May, 2021. This site is close to its original location.

Total cost of the project was \$6,500

2. Ocean Grove Entry Identification –

The Club, together with the Ocean Grove Business Association and the Ocean Grove Community Association, organised an "ideas" competition, seeking input on how to improve the quality of the entry signage to the town. Approximately sixty entries were received from the community (20) and local schools.

The entries were judged by the three COGG councillors. Sixteen entries representing the ideas from the Ocean Grove community were selected and forwarded to Council for further development into practical signs.

3. Grubb Road Walking Track/Adopt a Roadside

The Club has approached "Adopt a Roadside", part of VicRoads, to obtain approval to undertake routine maintenance along the Grubb Road verge.

CGG has approached ParksVictoria to install a pedestrian gate in the southeast corner of the OG Nature Reserve to provide pedestrians with a route, other than along Grubb Road

4. Lookout Reserve

COGG has reopened discussions with the Club in relation to developing the masterplan for the Lookout Reserve. It is anticipated that further "hands-on" activities will continue next Rotary Year.

5. R100 Celebrations

Along with other clubs in the Geelong Region, Ocean Grove Rotary participated in the R100 Baton Relay to celebrate 100 years of Rotary in Australia.

The Club also proposes to plant 100 trees as a permanent recognition of the Centenary, and COGG is working with Rotary in identifying suitable locations.

OG Rotary has applied for a District Grant to assist with the costs of this project

6. Marconi Memorial

Following the closure of Queenscliff Rotary Club, and its absorption into Ocean Grove Rotary, the Club has considered projects in the Borough of Queenscliffe.

The first project is likely to be the refurbishment and relocation of the Marconi Monument in Point Lonsdale. (The monument is currently hidden behind vegetation and there is no safe parking, therefore the monument is generally unknown.)

The Borough has funds available and has accepted OG Rotary's offer of assistance.

- The group now concentrating on a District 9780 and or Rotary global grant.

Youth Service Report

The Committee members are: Meredith O'Neill [Chair], Judy Greer, Geoff Chandler, Tony Haines, Adrian Schmidt, Michelle Fox, Jenny Wright, Xenia Williamson, Lorraine Batrouney, Lyndy Stagg, Joanne McDowell and Graham O'Donnell. The full committee met by Zoom in July 2020 and June 2021 for the purpose of setting program priorities, annual program planning and setting a draft budget for Board approval. Thank you to Rod Bush for his assistance with Zoom.



The full committee also met in scheduled club assembly sessions that were part of Rotary meetings. Sincere thanks to members of the Youth Committee for their commitment and support in the past year.

The Graham Bath Community Award sub committee met for the purposes of updating our insurance requirements and making adjustments to the program due to Covid restrictions. Sub committee members kept in regular communication on a needs basis.

The Youth Services Budget

In July 2020 the Youth Services Chairperson received communication from the President and the Board that club fundraising opportunities had been severely restricted due to COVID and the Board was now directing service committees to select one area for priority spending. The proposed Youth Services budget was significantly reduced. The selected area for priority spending was school based awards. The committee is now planning for the resumption of Rotary programs and a return to normal budgets.

Rotary Youth Programs

The Rotary District 9780 Youth Programs that we previously participated in were cancelled due to Covid. These programs included Youth Exchange (we were not a recent participant), RYLA and RYPEN. There were Education Department restrictions on excursions and camps for much of the year and the Science Experience Program for Year 9 and 10 students did not run. The club had previously decided not to participate in the National Youth Science forum that was to be held in Canberra in January 2021. The local club Graham Bath Junior Community Awards for 2020 were cancelled in term 1 due to school lockdowns and restrictions on visitor access to schools.

The Graham Bath Junior Community Awards program resumed in term 1, 2021. The Youth Services Committee is planning for participation in the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) for young people aged 18 -25 to be held in September 2021. The Committee is also planning to participate in the Science Experience program, the National Youth Science Forum and the new Careers and Leadership in Agriculture program which is a district initiative.

The Graham Bath Rotary Junior Community Awards – Local Primary Schools

The 2021 program commenced during term 1 with a total of 51 students from four invited schools taking part. The participating schools in the Junior Community Awards program are Ocean Grove Primary School, Surfside Primary School, Star of the Sea Primary Schools in Ocean Grove and Wallington Primary School.

To work around Covid issues for 2021, activities involving interaction with elderly community members such as those working in Opportunity shops and residing in Aged Care facilities have been deemed `unsuitable'. Other activity modifications are to be made on a needs basis as the program proceeds and Covid guidelines vary.

We continue to appreciate the warm welcome that schools extend to our Rotarians and also the excellent support that we receive from the Year 6 teachers.

Thank you to Tony Haines, Judy Greer, Xenia Williamson and Jenny Wright for their involvement in the program and their work commitment.

Support for Bellarine Secondary College Students

These awards are usually presented or recognised at the formal college presentation evening in December. Due to Covid the presentation evening was cancelled. A Rotary representative was

invited to a planned whole school presentation assembly in February but this was also cancelled.

Roy Rose Citizenship Awards

These awards are for students who have demonstrated a willingness to contribute to the health and well being of the college and its students. In previous years the awards were \$100 for a Year 7-8 student, \$150 for a years 9 -10 student and \$250 for a years 11-12 student. Due to financial cut backs the Youth Services Committee agreed to change these awards to a \$50 book voucher for a student in years 7-8 and a student in year 9-10. The student in years 11-12 received a \$100 book voucher.

VCE Support Award

This school selection needs based award of \$2000 (\$1000 per year over 2 years) is held in trust at the school and used to contribute to the students' booklist, uniform, computer, vocational education and excursion expenses.

The VCE Awards presentation Rotary dinner was held in November. It was disappointing that our `retiring' year 12 recipient and the ongoing year 11 to year 12 recipient did not attend. Sophie Arkle was presented with the year 11 award and her presentation to the Rotary club was well received.

Meredith O'Neill will be involved in further communication with the college on the award selection process and the need to ensure that award recipients have a clear understanding of the expectations attached to the awards. Due to the Covid restrictions and other factors it was sometimes difficult for her to do the required follow up.

Youth Services Compliance Matters

Meredith O'Neill is the Designated Youth Protection Officer. There is an expectation that members of the Youth Services Committee have the required Working with Children's check and this is mandatory if members are entering schools or having direct contact with children. The Secretary is the Club Public Officer who does the Rotary District required follow up interview checks with referees.

President Gillian Morgan and sub committee members Meredith O'Neill, Tony Haines and Judy Greer worked to ensure that all our insurance documentation was up to date and met district insurance requirements. This included the new insurance pro formas and risk assessments for activities.

Acknowledgement of Geoff Chandler

The Youth Services Committee acknowledges the service of Geoff Chandler. Geoff was previously a Regional Director of Education and was regarded in high esteem by the school leaders and teachers working in our region. Geoff has brought his expertise and his calm, rational manner of decision making to the work of our committee. He has mentored new members and we have benefitted from his wisdom. Thank you Geoff.

Summer Market Report

This season we had 6 markets instead of the gazetted 7 due to missing the October market because of Covid 19. Overall takings from the several fundraising areas (treasurer report) was \$58,700



Stallholder attendance was up and almost all markets had more applications than we had sites, which was a great result for the club. Some of the excess may have been

due to the fact that some markets such as Lonsdale and Queenscliff did not resume for some time after Christmas.

The November market was attended by a huge crowd probably due to the relief of being finally able to get out of lockdown and enjoy a bit of freedom and spending some of their excess cash at our market.

All markets after this one were well attended despite some very inclement weather experienced on the first three markets after November.

The board decided to use our members to do all Voluntary gold coin collections this season and a big thanks goes to all the helpers. We were able to cover all 7 gates from 9 to 12.30 and we had some record takings ranging from \$1800 on the wet market day, to the last markets where we took \$4700. Thanks to the partners and family members who helped in this terrific effort.

Total gold coin was just on \$20,000 which is an amazing amount to be given by the general public which was donated to many various communities.

Stallholder takings totalled over \$18000 averaging over \$3000 per market. Costs were higher than we would have liked: -

The Ocean Grove Park committee get around \$550 per market (total over \$3000), and we had extra costs for setting up due to COVID 19. Sadly, some of our boards we have around the entrances to Ocean Grove were destroyed or taken by vandals and had to be replaced at a significant cost. Also, John Paton had new core flute signs made for the Voluntary gold coin collection which was a welcome relief from carrying the very heavy wood and metal signs we had been using for markets over the years. They should last us several years. Hopefully our costs will be down significantly next season.

While we didn't run the normal raffle out of our BBQ setup due to COVID 19, Geoff Ford, Bill Walton and Chris Watson and several others ran a Weber BBQ raffle donated by Home Hardware, and made over \$3000 for the club.

The Egg and Bacon sandwich and Sausage Sizzle run by Coog was again a resounding success at the market, and thanks to all the hard-working members who staffed it. Including 2 Bunnings, 2 Queenscliff and the Duck Race, The BBQ raised a massive \$18,800 and after expenses, cleared a little over \$14000.

Our market days are only successful with the help of many Rotarians, partners and family helping out, and most markets saw around 50 helpers, so for that I must say a BIG thank you to you all.

Although we are nearly to the end of our Financial year, the Street Festival will be held in July and Rotary has a position in that. We will be selling tokens to build a line of Gold in the Main Street. It should be fun and Coral and her Committee are getting their spruiking voices ready for the big day.

To date \$7500 has been raised and we are hopeful of a further \$2/3000 from the Gala Day

Oral History Project



Oral histories are an increasingly popular method for recording stories of an area's past which reflect residents' experiences of those times. The lower Bellarine Peninsula is undergoing rapid changes with an influx of new families, housing developments and tourist facilities.

Many of these new residents and visitors are unaware of the social life, landscape and townships that existed here in earlier days. Long-time residents of the towns of Barwon Heads, Wallington, Ocean Grove, Point Lonsdale, and Queenscliff were asked to recount their memories of what life was like in the area in the post-war period from the 1940s to the end of the 1970s. Some memories went even further back. Their stories were recorded by members of the Rotary Club, edited by inserting photographs and images of other memorabilia, and placed on our website for public viewing.

This project began under the COVID lockdown as an option for Club members when our normal projects had to be suspended. By the time we had completed the training and organisation, lockdown had been lifted. Nevertheless, the interviews went ahead with the advantage that we could meet face to face with our narrators. There are now around twenty interviews available for viewing with more to come.

They tell stories of when towns such as Ocean Grove and Point Lonsdale were small, somewhat ramshackle collections of houses among the teatree, many constructed by the residents themselves or fibro holiday shacks. Holiday visitors camped along the foreshore in tents and holiday fun was found on the beach, the large sandhills which backed it, catching eels in the river, and shooting rabbits. Known for their fishing fleets, Barwon Heads and Queenscliff were the more significant towns, Queenscliff had the high school and Barwon Heads the police station.

Wallington, somewhat like today, was a rural farming area predominantly potato growing and orchards. The narrators tell how community infrastructure was developed, much of it constructed by the locals themselves. There are stories of how the fire brigade and the maternal health centre came to Ocean Grove, and many tell of their experiences at the local primary schools which had far fewer students than today. Churches, sports clubs, and Town Halls were the centres of social activity, dances and cinemas the popular meeting places for young people. The interviews give the perspectives of people who spent their childhood in the lower Bellarine, regular family holiday visitors and post-war immigrants.

The interviewing team consisted of Rod Greer, Alison George, Heather Willson, Judy Greer, Pearl Macmillan, Michelle Fox, Noel Emselle, Ann Hodgkinson, Marg Campbell, Coral Barker and Rod Bush. Many conducted several interviews, with Coral Barker staring with five!

Rod Bush provided technical backup, convinced us all to video record the interviews on our phones, computers and tablets, edited the films, and fixed our mistakes. The interviews can be seen by going to the Rotary Club of Ocean Grove website and clicking on the button on the front page which takes you into the site. Enjoy.

Grant Sourcing

It's an interesting process sourcing, and then applying for a grant that will help fund the various projects of the club. Finding the sources, and then 'playing the game' of writing an application according to the criteria is a challenge.

There are a great number of grants available, but in the end there are generally only one or two that are realistic options.

Our Applications

- This year we have been able to carry over the 2019/20 District Grant for the re-erecting of the sculpture at the Sport and Aquatic Centre. The sculpture is now in place and will have the signage attached shortly.
- Through the **Rotary District Centenary Grant, \$1,000** was gained to do sign writing that will recognise 100 Years of Rotary in Australia. This will be placed on our new BBQ trailer.
- A \$5000 Stronger Communities Program 6 Grant was made through a Federal Govt Fund administered by our local Federal MP, Libby Coker. This was to help in funding the BBQ trailer (last year we were able to source a similar amount for the trailer through a Geelong Community Grant.)
- An application is pending through the Victorian State Government for funding that will support an **exhibition of the Oral History Project**. If successful the exhibition will occur in late January.
- A **District Grant for 2021/22** is being sought to support the **planting of 100 trees** that will recognise the centenary fo Rotary in Australia.

Thank you to all those who highlighted the various sources of grants, and those who have assisted in the preparation of applications.

Duck Race Report

The Rotary Club had an opportunity to organise a long-standing event in Barwon Heads and the Annual Duck Race was held on Saturday 4th April. (This event was originally run by the Festival by the Sea or the Barwon Heads "Sheepwash Classic" race event organisers.)

The previous event organisers were unable to run the event and were willing to share funds with the Rotary Club, allocating 25% to Rotary, Barwon Heads Association, Barwon Heads Primary School and the Barwon Heads Scouts respectively.

After collecting some \$1500.00 in prizes from local businesses, the tickets were allocated at 600 on line using "Eventbrite" and 620 for face-to-face sales. Tickets were allocated to Rotary members, Barwon Heads Association members and the Barwon Heads Scouts to sell – in packs of 5.

The online tickets sold out 3 days prior to the event. The face-to-face sales sold out 2 hours prior to the event. Tickets were \$10 per duck and "Eventbrite took \$1.40 per duck to sell it but the face-to-face sales allocated all funds to the event organisers.

Race Day proved a challenge at 30 degrees with a strong north wind threatening to blow the ducks out to sea. After waiting an extra hour to allow for a stronger tide flow the race was run – involving tipping the ducks off the footbridge over the Barwon River, allowing the ducks to float toward the finish line 400 metres away at the Ozone Jetty (which they didn't achieve instead beaching themselves on the Ocean Grove side of the river) However, the race rules allow for the weather and 10 winners were collected and prizes allocated respectively.

A total of over \$11,000 was collected giving the 4 recipients over \$2700 each and these funds were presented at a Rotary club meeting one month later.
