Report of Meeting: 19/11/2019

Identifying and Responding to Family Violence, Pavillon, Shell Road

Andrea Tierney welcomed all in attendance and introduced the two speakers: Lee Fitzroy from the Sexual Assault and Family Violence Centre, (SAFV) and Natasha Powles from the Training Unit, South-West Division of Victorian Police. Both speakers acknowledged the traditional owners of the land, the Wadawurrung people, and paid their respects to the Aboriginal people.



Lee Fitzroy said that the vision of the SAFV Centre was to promote recovery and a community free from sexual assault and family violence. Family violence occurs within families when a family member intentionally used physical violence, treats, coercion or intimidation to control or manipulate a partner

or former partner or family member. It involves a betrayal of trust which makes it difficult for the victim to tell others about it. It can involve elder abuse, abuse of children and disabled people, not just violence towards intimate family members, and can involve verbal, physical and psychological abuse. Children are affected even if they are not directly attacked. Women are more likely to experience violence and the perpetrator is usually a known male, occurs in a private place and is ongoing. Men also experience violence but the perpetrator is usually an unknown male, it occurs in a public place and is a one-off incident. One women is killed by a male partner or ex-partner

almost every week in Australia and children are present in one out of three family violence cases reported to the police. The impact is not just physical and can involve poor mental health, social isolation, poor parenting, fear, anxiety, homelessness and poverty.

Natasha Powles works at the Police Training Unit to upskill police when responding to family violence incidents. Their aim is to change attitudes about how to respond, how to prosecute perpetrators, gather evidence, etc. All recruits now undergo this training. In the past 12 months, police responded

to 84,500 incidents of family violence, 4,500 in Geelong. The role of the police is to ensure victims are safe and investigate whether criminal behaviour was involved. Police are obligated to investigate incidents to which they are called, refer the situation to other services and to issue intervention orders if needed. Police reports are sent to Orange Door and then referred on to other organisations. Where concerns exist, information is shared around other services. Police prepare a comprehensive report covering 39 standard questions for each incident.

There are now 10 detectives in Geelong just doing family violence cases. They are based at the same location as SAFV. All organisations undertake the same risk assessment when responding to family violence calls. Police carry iPads and body worn cameras to expedite investigations. 9,490 iPads have been used in police investigations and 7,892 body worn cameras have been activated during investigations. Some situations involve serious and complex violence and in these cases specialist investigative responses are undertaken. Family violence is a complex area in law and the police reports help unpack the situation. For example, adolescent perpetrators may

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be reflecting past childhood trauma. Schools now run respectful relationship programs to provide younger children with information. Organisations are attempting to achieve cultural change by working with male perpetrators to help them understand the consequences of their actions. Mental health, drug and alcohol disorders also complicate family behaviours. Many incidents of family violence are not reported to the police. If you have concerns about a situation, contact one of the above organisations about possible actions. Callers can remain anonymous when reporting possible incidents.

At the close of the meeting, an excellent supper was provided to attendees. The majority of those attending were from the Rotary Club, but some other community members also came.

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
